

'Tis the fall season for travel, adventurous Lake City travels including recently returned Phil and Carolyn Virden who report a fun time motoring about France for several weeks last month.

Inveterate explorer Ben Hake of Lake City Recreation has taken time out from ice farming and other Rec Dept.related activities to explore portions of Barcelona, Spain, accompanied by newly-seated town trustee Landon Whinnery and Colorado Air National Guardbound Bjorn Piltinsgrud.

In addition to marveling at Barcelona architecure, the Lake City travelers also ventured over into northern Portugal with stops at Porto, a designated World Heritage site located on the River Douro adjacent to Vila Nova de Gaia.

Among the remarkable engineering feats at Porto, Portugal, is the Don Luis I

northern Spain earlier this fall. After flying to

Santiago de Compostela, the Gardiners and Swanson took a bus to Sarria, Spain, in late September for the start of their hike. Each day for a total of nine days they hiked

roughly eight to nine miles per day (11 miles on their longest one-day hike), headquartering along the route in hotels and smaller inns known as *alberques*, a majority of which were charming stone accommodations dating to medieval times.

The route of their adventure took the travelers from Sarria

to their first overnight at a small stone inn at Morgade, and in

following days overnighting at Portomarin, Ventas de Noron, Palas de Rei, Melida, Azua, O Pino, Xann Xordo, and finally, Santiago de Compostela, which is the final resting place of St. James, the apostle who originally trudged the historic pilgrims' route.

Especially memorable for the Lake City couples were the ancient stone churches which they visited at every stop, Bruce Gardiner telling inquisitive Lake Citians that the people which they encountered every step along the way including an international array of fellow hikers such as like-minded, adventurous spirits from Australia and Capetown, South Africa — were without fail "very, very friendly and hospitable." "It made for some great memories," says Bruce, "and we're

frequently littered with both fallen chestnuts and apples, other fascinating features including corn storage buildings known as horreos which were typical at nearly every farm they passed. Weathered

very glad we made the hike."

On their initial hiking departure from Sarria, says Jane Swanson, "our first shock on leaving the town was finding that the trail was precipitiously uphill for a considerable distance."

"We were amazed by the views," Jane continues, "as we hiked through herds of grazing sheep and cattle," roosters "announcing that it was morning."

Temperatures gradually increased during the early part of the hike and the hikers lingered along shady, chestnut-strewn portions of the trail.
